BLACK LIVES MATTER TOWN HALLS

In support of the Black Lives Matter movement, Spence-Chapin led its first series of town halls focused on race, which brought families together to discuss the challenges they face due to institutionalized racism, the tools they use to cope, and how they support and encourage one another in these difficult times. Spence-Chapin has continued to hold webinars and provide other opportunities for our families to come together and discuss important and pertinent issues.



OUTREACH TO COMMUNITIES AND SATELLITE OFFICES

Spence-Chapin is actively expanding our outreach to underserved communities throughout New York City and Upstate New York to bring our services to more women, children, and families. Social workers visited with dozens of hospitals and social service organizations upstate, while a partnership with AG Urgent Care has been forged that will bring social workers to urgent care centers in Brownsville, Brooklyn and Jamaica, Queens for the first time ever.



WELCOME HOME GALA

At Chelsea Piers, Spence-Chapin hosted its Annual Gala to celebrate our second century of service, and to "Welcome Home" adoptive families, friends, and supporters. The lively event, which raised more than \$300,000 to support our programs, honored three remarkable individuals, Siya Madikane, Curtis R. Welling, and Mary H. White, M.D, and featured a live performance by Darryl "DMC" McDaniels of Run-DMC.



GRANNY PROGRAM EXPANSION AND PROJECT PLAY

Through a generous grant from an anonymous family charitable trust, Spence-Chapin and its partner in South Africa, Jo'burg Child Welfare (JCW), began expansion of the Granny Program and launched Project Play to impact the lives of children living in orphanages. In just a few months, the program has grown by 260% and the first of four state-ofthe-art playgrounds has been completed.


